

FROM THE MINISTER

2025 AD is fast drawing to a close. The warm summer weather is here. We are fortunate in Hawke's Bay to be living in a 'sun trap' where temperatures tend to be warmer than most other parts of the country.

The return of summer each year brings back happy memories for most Kiwis. Trips to the beach, or Splash Planet, maybe to Fiji, the Cook Islands or Bali. Or maybe just local trips where we have caught up with friends and loved ones. Whatever summer means to you, I hope it will also remind you of the warmth of God's goodness. Like the sunlight, God's love is everywhere and for everyone, even when we take it for granted.

I never get tired of hearing the story of Christmas because it is a story of Hope. Against all the odds a baby is born in a stable to an unlikely couple. He is pursued by both good and evil people – Wisemen and shepherds - and an evil king who would snuff out his life. He and his parents become refugees and flee to Egypt, returning years later, when it is safe to do so.

The baby is given the name, 'Emmanuel' meaning 'God is with us'. And his life will make all the difference to billions of people, down through the ages, including a small multitude of us in Havelock North.

Every year we celebrate his life in the lovely warmth of another Kiwi summer. We recall the Hope, Joy, Peace and Love that the birth of Christ brings. These are his heavenly gifts to us.

This year, I will be going to Auckland to spend Christmas with my children and extended family, some of whom are coming from overseas. It will be only the second time in my 40 years of ministry, that I will not be taking the Christmas services. I will attend the Christmas services at my family church in Auckland. I will also be preaching on the first Sunday of 2026, in the Bay of Islands Uniting Church in Paihia. (I think it's called a 'busman's holiday').

Here in Havelock North, Mrs Anne Keown (Lay Celebrant) and the Rev Craig Kilgour will lead the Christmas services. The Rev Warren Fortune will do the last service for 2025 (Dec 28) and the first service for 2026, January 4th. I urge you to support those services as we transition into a new year.

Finally, thank you for your support of my family and my ministry. It's been a pleasure working at St Columba's with so many good people. Thank you for your support of our parish.

I wish you a merry Christmas and a Happy New Year. May this blessed season be a time of Hope, Joy, Peace and Love for you and your loved ones.



A BIT OF HISTORY

During alterations in the 1990’s to create two offices, Ivan Stewart and Sam Browne uncovered a remarkable little relic hidden within the building. Tucked away behind the wall was a piece of timber bearing handwritten inscriptions—presumably made by one of the original builders when the church was constructed in 1970–1971.

The name on the timber is Dick Clarke, who noted that he was 25 years old in June 1971. Alongside his name were glimpses into life at the time: contractors earned \$1.41 per hour, a jug of beer cost 43 cents, and petrol was 49 cents a gallon.

This simple piece of wood offers a charming window into the past and a reminder of the generations who helped shape our church home. What a delight to rediscover a small part of our story!

Teach us to use wisely all the time we have

A woman once had a dream in which an angel was giving her a message: as a reward for her virtues, the sum of \$1440 would be deposited into her bank account every morning. The amount had only one condition: at the close of each business day, any balance that had not been used would be cancelled. It wouldn't carry over to the next day or accrue interest. Each morning a new \$1440 would be credited to her.

The dream was so vivid that when she woke up, she asked the Lord to explain what it meant. He led her to understand that she was receiving 1440 minutes every morning - the exact number of minutes in a 24-hour day. What she did with the deposit of time was important because 1440 minutes per day were all she would ever receive!

And you have a similar account. At the close of each day, you should be able to look back with joy and satisfaction and see that those golden minutes were invested wisely. Someone has said "Time is God's gift to you, but what you do with it, is your gift to God."

And it's true. 70 years are given to you, and for many of us a lot more but teach us to realise the brevity of life, so that we may grow in wisdom. And may the Lord our God show us his approval and make our efforts successful.

I sometimes reflect what I had done (or not done) with my 1440 minutes, and I often have very little to show for my day!! Some of you may look back on your day with the satisfaction of knowing that you have achieved a lot, but I am sure that many of you can identify with me by not having done as much as intended!

Thinking of some of the great people of the past, such as Mother Theresa and Albert Schweitzer, I know that my greatest efforts would pale into insignificance compared to these great souls and all they achieved.
