FROM THE MINISTER Pentecost, Come Holy Spirit, Come.

Pentecost Sunday is a significant day in Christianity. It marks the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the apostles and other followers of Jesus, as described in Acts 2. This event is considered the birth of the Christian Church, as it empowered the disciples to spread the gospel to people of all nations.

The name "Pentecost" comes from the Greek word meaning "fiftieth," as it occurs 50 days after Easter. The dramatic events of Pentecost include a mighty rushing wind, tongues of fire, and the apostles speaking in different languages, allowing them to communicate with people from various regions. This moment reinforced the idea that the gospel was meant for all people, regardless of language or background.

Today, Pentecost Sunday is celebrated in churches worldwide, often emphasizing themes of renewal, empowerment, and the mission of spreading faith. It remains a powerful reminder of the Holy Spirit's presence and the unity of believers across cultures and generations.

One of the things I have enjoyed about life in the Church is that it is made up of people of many different cultures and races – whole populations have at some time, been blessed by the coming of the Holy Spirit revealing Christ to them. He comes as a Christ who speaks your language and knows your joys and your challenges no matter where you come from.

Just as we see the image of God (Imago Dei) in every person (if we look hard enough) – the image of God is in the goodness in every culture - especially those influenced by the Gospel.

I remember visiting Turkey in 2008 and looking for a church to worship in on Sunday. My wife and I finally found a Catholic Church hidden behind a high wall. We could hardly understand the African preacher, but we felt at home in the familiar architecture and the familiar liturgy of a Christian Church - especially in the Sacrament of Holy Communion and the preaching of The Word.

I'm a bit of a 'Foodie'. I like tasting food of different cultures. I believe that the risen Jesus in us enjoys Italian food as much as South African, or Indian food, although the universal food that He offers all of us, is bread and wine, symbolising his own body and blood. Symbolizing His love and his life given for us. The fruits of the Spirit are love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness and self-

control. (*Galatians 5: 22*). If we are blessed by the Holy Spirit, we will experience these fruits in our lives.

Long may we taste these fruits.

This year we will be holding an Ecumenical Pentecost service at 4pm on Sunday 08 June. We hope as many St Columba's people as possible will be there for that local service.

Every blessing as we head into winter. May the Holy Spirit warm us, body mind and Spirit.

ELDERS' UPDATE: HIGHLIGHTS FROM RECENT MEETINGS

Here are a few key updates from recent meetings:

Worship and Special Services

Iona College Founders Day Service (23 March) was hosted at St Columba's and received warm feedback from both our parish and the Iona school community. It was a vibrant expression of ecumenical partnership and shared faith.

Earth Day Service (27 April), led by SCHNEG in collaboration with Rev. Mo Morgan from A Rocha, was deeply meaningful. The service was followed by a fruitful meeting with Mo. As a result, the suggestion was made to consider a special Matariki celebration in the future.

Easter Services were well attended. Highlights included the Maundy Thursday service, the Walk of Witness on Good Friday, and a joyful Easter Sunday communion. The Easter Monday Special Market, coordinated by Kevin Rose and the White Elephant team, was a success.

Rev. Wayne Toleafoa has experienced two recent family bereavements.

<u>Pastoral Care Discussion</u>: A suggestion was made to establish a dedicated Pastoral Care Group. While the idea was noted, the meeting reaffirmed that pastoral care remains a vital and ongoing responsibility of the Elders, forming a core part of their ministry within the church.

Outreach and Community Engagement

The ANZAC Day BBQ, hosted by the Focus Group following the Havelock North service, raised \$270 for the Hastings RSA. Plans are already in motion to build on this success in 2026.

Welcome Packs for new parishioners are nearly ready for distribution—a warm gesture to help newcomers feel at home.

Environmental Focus

SCHNEG's presence continues to be a quiet yet powerful influence within the congregation. Their commitment to stewardship and justice is shaping attitudes through steady, thoughtful engagement.

Church Leadership and Administration

No nominations were received for Moderator Designate at this time.

Sally Russell has stepped down from Church Council due to ill health. Her contributions were acknowledged with appreciation.

The HB Pressie meeting held on 30 April was successfully hosted at St Columba's, with positive feedback and a renewed focus on identifying future areas for growth.

Thank you to all Elders, volunteers, and parishioners who continue to serve faithfully and contribute to the vibrant life of our church.

FINANCIAL UPDATE (APRIL 2025)

As we reflect on the financial health of our parish in April 2025, we are both encouraged and cautious. Encouraged, because your generous response to the call for increased offerings has made a tangible difference. Cautious, because while we appear in a solid financial position, we face steadily rising costs and several significant upcoming expenses.

In April alone, our total income was \$16,360, with offerings making up the largest share. Market revenue and the Book Shop also contributed well. However, our monthly expenses reached \$26,443—resulting in a net deficit of \$10,084 for the month.

Rising Costs

Several essential costs have notably increased:


- **Power and utilities** cost \$783 in April, a marked increase from the same month last year.
- **Insurance** for both the church and the manse totalled \$1,731 for the month and expected to rise in the coming year.
- **Repairs and maintenance** came to over \$11,000, largely due to urgent plumbing work at the manse.

These increasing expenses reflect broader trends in the cost of living and maintaining church facilities. While we have been able to draw from investment reserves to meet urgent needs (including a recent \$15,000 withdrawal), this is not a sustainable strategy in the long term.

Income Trends

We are grateful to report that year-to-date income from offerings is up over 37% compared to this time last year—an encouraging sign of our community's commitment. Additional income from mini markets, room hire, and programme activities also supports our mission.

The Road Ahead

Despite our positive trajectory, we must prepare for ongoing pressures:

- Further **building maintenance** and infrastructure updates are expected.
- Utilities and insurance costs are projected to continue rising.

• We want to ensure we can sustain ministry activities and community outreach without reductions.

We encourage parishioners who are able to consider a small increase in their regular offerings. Every contribution helps us to maintain and grow the work of the church in Havelock North. Thank you once again for your continued generosity and prayerful support.

OUR FUNERAL POLICY

We understand the importance of supporting families during times of loss, and we aim to ensure that our funeral arrangements reflect both care and clarity. Please take note of the following guidelines:

1. Officiating Minister

As a general rule, funerals held at our church are conducted by our parish minister, Rev Wayne Toleafoa. Occasionally, families may request another minister to officiate. Such requests must be made directly to Rev Toleafoa, who will consider them on a case-by-case basis.

Please note: these are expected to be rare exceptions, and normally it would not be appropriate for a lay celebrant to lead a funeral in our church.

2. Booking Enquiries

3. Use of Organist

Our church organ is normally played by our regular organists. Families may occasionally request a different organist, but this must be approved by the parish minister after consultation with our charge organist.

Please note: The church does not provide sound equipment for playing CDs or audio via the sound system. However, a music or video presentation can be played via HDMI connection to the television screens—typically organised by the funeral director.

CYCLONE RELIEF

It's been a busy and fulfilling time supporting those still impacted by the flooding.

I've been delivering goods to Pakowhai and the surrounding area, including to a family on King Street who were in need of assistance. A vineyard in Levin also reached out to ask if more fencing wire was needed—after posting the question, I received confirmation that Pakowhai still requires wire. So, I'll be making another trip to Levin in June to collect and deliver what's needed.

At Abbyfield House, I managed to secure support from two Trusts and passed their details on to Lucy, the coordinator. Unfortunately, a third application was declined—although it met the criteria, it was a Trust focused solely on men, and they were overwhelmed with applications.

In April, I received a donation of linen, which has all been distributed to flood victims. We are now on the lookout for a second-hand kitchen, as Mary Doyle is no longer donating units. If anyone is removing a kitchen, please let us know—there's a couple from Pakowhai who could really use one.

Just when I thought I had met most of the flood victims, I came across an older couple in Omahu who had lost everything. We were able to deliver a beautiful queen bed to them—they were absolutely elated and deeply grateful.

I had also arranged for a spa pool to be donated to a couple in Whirinaki who had received a new Mitre 10 house. Sadly, that donation fell through at the last minute, after I had already organised a crane and borrowed a trailer. This was the first time I've been let down in this work, and it was a bit of a blow—but I'll keep going.
