FROM THE MINISTER

The Season of Lent – the Autumn of The Christian year

Lent is a bit like the autumn of the Christian year. It is a season when we try to discard things that have weighed us down. Like the trees which shed their old leaves. A season when we come down to the core of who we are before God. A time to be honest to God, and honest to ourselves.

During the season of Lent I find it helpful to read some of the penitential psalms. Psalms which acknowledge our sins and our shortcomings. Psalms which also speak of God's forgiveness when we are honest to God and honest with ourselves. Psalm 32 is just such a psalm. It is also about 'the joy of forgiveness'.

I don't know if you've ever felt the joy of forgiveness. It usually comes when we do something to rectify the things that are wrong in our lives.

There's nothing worse than having something 'hanging over you'- something you have done, or said , which you now regret. Or something you promised to do which you still haven't got

around to doing yet. Or, nothing worse than having a conviction which you have not acted upon, as time to act runs out...

I've done all those things and, reading David's psalm, suggests to me that he also had many 'things hanging over him' that needed to be rectified and resolved.

³While I kept silent, my body wasted away through my groaning all day long. ⁴For day and night your hand was heavy upon me; my strength was dried up as by the heat of summer. *Selah*

Its as if we are wasting away. As if the hand of God is weighing us down. As if our energy and motivation have been sapped from our very bodies, until we take action and do something about whatever it is that is 'hanging over' us.

⁵Then I acknowledged my sin to you, and I did not hide my iniquity; I said, "I will confess my transgressions to the LORD," and you forgave the guilt of my sin. *Selah*



Lent is the perfect season/time to acknowledge those things that are 'hanging over us' needing to be acknowledged and resolved.

Some of those 'things' may be too hard for us to resolve in our own strength, but God who is ever faithful, will help us when we reach out in prayer and when we reach out to forgive the grudges we hold against others who have sinned against us.

The good news about Lent and about Autumn is that it only lasts for a season and is followed by winter and spring - each season bringing its special blessing.

Let's hope and pray that we may again know the joy of forgiveness.


WOMEN'S COFFEE CLUB

A poem for Anzac Day based upon the message contained in a letter written by a young serviceman shortly before his death in action.



"Build us no cold stone monuments," they said, "To stand unchanging through our own lost years, No chiselled words, no dutiful, bowed head. From out this wilderness of blood and tears Build us a freedom mightier than before, That we may say, 'It was worth dying for!'

"This is our trust to you, who live to know The sunlight falling on a grassy steep, Who feel the salt spray flying, winds that blow, Hear friendly poplars whisper in their sleep, See mountain peaks stand clear against the light, The evening star hung low to greet the night.

"We gave up all these things, the years ahead, Rich with the promise of what might have been, So much undone, so many words unsaid, All glorious life untasted and unseen. Yet, shall a freer world arise again We cannot count our sacrifice in vain.

"We are the men who swept the oceans free Of those who sought to cut our lifelines through, The sailors who did not come home from sea. Somewhere out there we sleep, beyond the blue. We died, but you must make all wars to cease, That other lads may sail the seas in peace!

We are the army, steady, khaki files Who fought and died upon a foreign strand A world away. Ten times a thousand miles From out the hell of swirling dust and sand, Jungles and mountain slopes, our challenge rings, 'Build us a world of clean and decent things!'

"We are the airmen. Swift-winged into flight We saved an Empire's heart. Ours was a world Of searchlight fingers stabbing through the night, Of desperate odds, and tired wings ne'er furled, Of death that split the skies with sudden flame – Remember us - and build in Freedom's name! "We are the dead. Remember us in these, Not wordy epitaph upon a scroll of stone, But in new life, new laws, new liberties, New understanding! Then shall we be one With that brave world! Yours now to strive and plan, To carry on the work that we began.

"For we have died in war, but when wars cease, Then you must not say merely, 'It is done!' But fight again, that in a lasting peace Faith, tolerance, and truth may well be won, That you may say, when we meet face to face, 'Truly we made your world a finer place!'"
